

New Innovation Centre open for business in Canterbury

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Canterbury Innovation Centre is now open for business and its launch is marked today at a handover ceremony. The Centre, funded by £7.3m from the South East England Development Agency (SEEDA), has opened with over a third of space already let to innovative local businesses.

The Centre will connect high growth, high tech businesses with academic expertise to help drive innovation and entrepreneurship. Office, studio and workshop spaces designed to support business start-ups are now available for those looking for a base in Canterbury. It is expected to create 2,000 jobs and support 800 new businesses in the future.

The Centre, which is managed by leading business centre specialist, Basepoint, is the first building on the wider science park based on the University of Kent campus. Developed in partnership with East Kent Spatial Development Company (EKSDC) to the highest environmental standards, it has achieved an Excellent BREEAM rating. Sustainable design elements include solar panels, rainwater harvesting and biomass boiler within a sensitive design tailored to the site.

Pam Alexander, Chief Executive of SEEDA said: "We are proud that our £7.3m investment has produced an exemplary building to connect local universities to innovative new high growth businesses. It will provide a superb hub in which technology-rich companies can establish, diversifying the business base in East Kent and benefiting from knowledge and skills transfer to enable them to go global fast. These are the types of businesses which SEEDA is supporting to drive the South East - and the UK - out of recession and back into sustainable growth and prosperity."

Professor Julia Goodfellow, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Kent, said: "The Innovation Centre is an integral part of the University's strategy to support the local economy and to encourage innovation and enterprise, making the region more attractive for graduates to stay and work locally."

Jo Clark, Basepoint's Centre Manager, said: "Although in its infancy, the Centre is already attracting a variety of businesses that fit the criteria of innovation and technology. Within the first month of opening, 35 out of the 85 units available have already been occupied, a huge achievement considering the current economic climate. We look forward to developing the Centre and creating an exciting new business community here."

The University of Kent, the UK's European University, was the first institution within the county to be granted a university charter. It has 17,000 students studying at Canterbury, Medway, Tonbridge, Brussels and Paris. It is a major educational, economic and cultural force throughout Kent, supporting innovation and enterprise across the region.

The University has consistently been rated as one of the best universities in the UK according to the National Student Survey.
